But it’s not clear her version of “working-class” includes the steel workers here. Perko didn’t vote for her. And, based on her opposition to President Joe Biden’s \$2 trillion infrastructure plan, which Perko sees as a lifeline for his struggling industry, he doesn’t think Boebert cares all that much about his union members. He has tried to schedule a meeting with her to discuss these issues, he says. But the door to her local office is often locked, and her staff doesn’t return his calls.</p> <p>...</p> <p>Among voters in Pueblo—the largest and most politically unpredictable city in Boebert’s vast district—there is a growing sense of exasperation with the freshman representative not yet six months into her tenure.</p> <p>...</p> <p>It’s this reality that makes voters like Perko frustrated with a U.S. representative they see as more focused on her own celebrity than her constituents. “I work for the people of Pueblo, not the people of Paris,” Boebert tweeted in January, a dig at the Paris Climate Accords. But several dozen Puebloans I’ve spoken with in recent weeks, including some who cast ballots for Boebert, say they’re angry that she appears to have spent more time headlining GOP fundraisers than hosting public meetings to listen to their needs. Boebert—whose office did not respond to multiple requests for comment—also has failed to push for policies that would help the community, these Pueblo residents say.</p>

First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our PACT Act largely aims to expand access to care from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to 3.5 million veterans who served after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attack and were exposed to toxic burn pits.</p> <p>...</p> <p>The legislation also expands presumptions related to Agent Orange — used largely during the Vietnam War — to veterans who served in Thailand, Cambodia, Laos and Guam.</p> <p><a href="#">Vote #516, H Res 1512 – National Defense Authorization Act, 12/8/22</a>  Boebert: Nay</p> <p><a href="#">“Here’s what’s in the \$858 billion defense bill.” CNN, 12/15/22</a>  The bill would provide a 4.6% increase in military basic pay for service members, the largest in 20 years. The Department of Defense’s civilian workforce would get the same raise.</p> <p>It would also bump up service members’ housing allowance by 2% and require a report on a “more transparent, fair, and flexible way to calculate the basic allowance for housing,” according to a summary from the House Armed Services Committee.</p> <p>The legislation would also increase the eligibility threshold for the Basic Needs Allowance, a new supplemental payment for low-income military families, to 150% of the federal poverty line, up from 130%.</p>

	<p>The NDAA would also increase funding for commissaries to help offset higher prices. And it would create a pilot program to reimburse military families for certain child care costs related to a permanent change of station.</p>

The U.S. is investing \$280 billion in semiconductor research, development and manufacturing, in hopes of getting chipmakers to bring manufacturing back to the U.S. That means more workers must be trained for the manufacturing jobs, and Graves wanted to hear from Colorado business leaders on how he can help.</p> <p>...</p> <p>CHIPS is credited for helping persuade Entegris Inc. and Microchip to expand in Colorado Springs. Bill Shaner, with Entegris, who was also at the roundtable, encouraged Graves to consider the supply chain all the way down to the raw materials. Entegris manufactures products for chipmakers like Intel and Samsung and is investing \$600 million in Colorado Springs to build a new production facility.</p>

The bill defines human beings protected under this measure as those “at all stages of life, including the moment of fertilization, cloning, or other moment at which an individual member of the human species comes into being.”</p>

	<p>The bill's language states this constitutional right is "vested in each human being," and does not indicate any exceptions in cases of rape, incest or when the pregnant person is at risk.</p> <p>...</p> <p>The Life at Conception Act, co-sponsored by Hinson, would outlaw all abortions with no exceptions in cases of rape, incest or risk to the pregnant person.</p>
